

Summary

This sermon explores the trial of Jesus from Mark 15:1-15, examining how Jesus faced accusations, crowds, and ultimately the cross. The message contrasts Jesus' focus on the cross with Pilate's focus on the crowd, highlighting how Jesus maintained confidence in God's plan despite external pressure. The sermon emphasizes that we often replace Jesus with idols in our lives, but Jesus offers the ultimate 'jersey swap' - exchanging His righteousness for our sin. Through the story of Barabbas being released while Jesus went to the cross, we see the gospel message that Jesus died in our place, offering salvation to all who accept His sacrifice.

Intro Prayer

Heavenly Father, we come before You today with open hearts and minds. We thank You for Your incredible love and the sacrifice of Your Son Jesus. As we gather together to study Your Word, we ask that You would speak to each of us individually. Help us to be receptive to what You want to teach us today. Remove any distractions or preconceived notions, and help us to truly hear from You. We pray that our discussion would draw us closer to You and to one another. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.

Questions

1. What does it mean to focus on the cross rather than the crowd? How can we practically apply this in our daily lives?

2. Pastor Dustin mentioned that 'the more time I'm intimate with God, the less time I'll be intimidated by people.' How can we develop greater intimacy with God?
3. How do you distinguish between external pressure and internal stress in your own life? What helps you maintain peace during high-pressure situations?
4. What are some modern-day 'idols' that people might replace Jesus with? Have you ever found yourself prioritizing something above your relationship with God?
5. Jesus remained silent during much of His trial. When might silence be a sign of strength rather than weakness? How do we know when to speak up versus when to remain quiet?
6. The sermon describes the 'jersey swap' between Jesus and us. What does it mean to you personally that Jesus took your place on the cross?
7. Barabbas was a murderer who went free while Jesus died. How does this story illustrate the concept of grace and undeserved favor?
8. What does it look like practically to 'surrender your life' to Jesus? How has this played out in your own spiritual journey?

Life Application

This week, identify one area where you've been focusing more on 'the crowd' (people's opinions, approval, or expectations) rather than 'the cross' (God's will and calling for your life). Make a conscious effort to shift your focus by spending extra time in prayer and Scripture reading about that specific area. When you feel pressure from others' opinions, remind yourself of your identity in Christ and make decisions based on His truth rather than human approval.

Key Takeaways

1. You cannot focus on the crowd and the cross at the same time - what you focus on determines your peace and direction
2. Silence is not weakness when you know who is in control - Jesus demonstrated confidence through His quiet trust in the Father
3. We don't just reject Jesus, we replace Him with idols - anything we prioritize above God becomes an idol in our lives
4. Jesus offers the ultimate 'jersey swap' - exchanging His righteousness for our sin through His death and resurrection
5. High pressure doesn't have to equal high stress when we are intimate with God rather than intimidated by people
