

Summary

This Easter sermon from Mark 16:1-8 focuses on the resurrection of Jesus and its personal implications for believers. Pastor Kevin emphasizes that the resurrection is a historical event supported by eyewitness testimony, the empty tomb, and the transformation of the disciples. The message highlights how Jesus calls people by name, particularly noting the angel's specific mention of Peter despite his denial of Christ. This demonstrates God's grace and inclusion of those who feel they have failed. The sermon concludes with the truth that no one is too far gone for God's love and forgiveness, as demonstrated through the resurrection power that can transform any life.

Intro Prayer

Ice Breaker

What is one of your favorite names and why? It could be your own name, a family member's name, or just a name you think sounds beautiful or meaningful.

Key Verses

3. 1 Timothy 1:15

Questions

1. The women came to the tomb expecting to find Jesus' body, but instead found an empty tomb. How do you think they felt in that moment of confusion and surprise?
2. Why do you think the angel specifically mentioned Peter by name when giving instructions to tell the disciples about Jesus' resurrection?
3. The pastor mentioned that Saturday (between crucifixion and resurrection) was a day of grief and uncertainty for the followers. Have you experienced a 'Saturday' season in your life? How did you get through it?
4. What evidence for the resurrection mentioned in the sermon do you find most compelling, and why?

5. The disciples went from hiding in fear to boldly proclaiming the gospel. What do you think caused such a dramatic transformation in their lives?
6. How does knowing that Jesus specifically included Peter despite his denial encourage you in your own relationship with God?
7. The sermon emphasized that 'you can't out-sin the cross.' What does this mean to you personally?
8. If someone asked you 'How do we know Jesus really rose from the dead?', how would you respond based on what we discussed today?

Life Application

This week, think of someone in your life who might feel like they are 'on the outside' or have failed in some way. Reach out to them with an encouraging word, letting them know they are valued and included. Consider sharing how God's grace has worked in your own life, and if appropriate, invite them to experience the hope and restoration that comes through Jesus.
